(I write stories/fanfiction on my spare time/before I go to sleep for myself, and use ChatGPT for a bit of help, with a lot of experimenting, I found a few ways to make it write a lot less robotically, But I will admit, I ask it to rewrite my words instead of just giving it "Write a story of XXX" or whatever.

Like, "Rewrite in X prose style" bla bla bla. Then I paste the text after the instructions.

A way I've found to reduce the detection rate of your writing being AI are these: Use the Gunning Fog index.

Using the numbers between 8 and 12, meaning grades 8 to 12 in high school 13 to 16 are college graduates, 17 to 20 are readable by advanced college students and professionals and 21+ are difficult to understand for most readers, including professionals. So with how I do it's: "Rewrite in X prose style while targeting a Gunning Fog index of 8"

The other two instructions I give it are:

"Don't use adjectives and adverbs until strictly necessary."

"Don't use complicated, complex or fancy words until strictly necessary." or "Do not use complicated, complex or fancy words." Either works.

I also have, like, 533 words and phrases I have ChatGPT try to avoid. It's still currently growing. Of course, most AI detectors are shit, so you can either get 0-100% regardless of how you do it. You can also ask AI the Gunning Fog index for authors, then put the number you want for those authors.

There are also, "Don't create concluding, summarizing or closing paragraphs." and "Don't create, assume or add your own context.")

So, I usually end up with something like:

Don't use adjectives and adverbs until strictly necessary.

Don't use complicated, complex or fancy words until strictly necessary.

Don't assume, add or create your own context.

Don't provide responses with a concluding or closing paragraphs.

Rewrite in the prose style of X (Don Giannatti)

(Or copy your prose style and improve it), targeting a Gunning Fog index of X:

(I go for an index of between 8 and 10.*)

It's nothing fancy, but it works for me...most of the time, if ChatGPT isn't fighting me on what I want it to rewrite.

EchoWriting Prompt 1 - Phrase Mapping

The most common EchoWriting technique; *phrase mapping,* which involves listing the common phrases you expect ChatGPT to use in it's output, then asking ChatGPT to replace them with words that you would use instead.

Not only is it the most effective echowriting method, but it's also the easiest to do. To achieve this, you first need to identify the <u>common phrases that ChatGPT frequently uses</u> when writing about your topic of interest. For instance, if ChatGPT often says "in summary" but you would rather say "Altogether," when writing scientific essays, then that's an easy swap. You just need to compile a list of these frequent phrases and words, then replace each one with terms that you naturally use in your writing.

Example Prompt:

"Throughout your response, retrofit the following phrases with my listed alternative: It's important to note - Just remember that
On the other hand - coming over to it's counterpart
Imagine - try to visualize
My friend - bro......"

Try replacing single words with longer phrases, as that helps to <u>vary the sentence lengths and</u> structure.

EchoWriting Prompt 2 - Asking ChatGPT To Mimic Your Writing Style

You can ask ChatGPT explicitly to write the way you write by providing a sample of your own text. This is essentially how AI models are trained, but with thousands, if not millions of samples.

This one isn't as effective as the first method above, but it still works. Why not try combining the two to create something more powerful!

Example Prompt:

"Rewrite the input text to mimic this specific tone and writing style, focusing on sentence structure, vocabulary level, punctuation, and linguistic techniques used in the following example: (enter your own text here)"

EchoWriting Prompt 3 - Identifying Your Linguistic Techniques

This one is pretty simple. Just give ChatGPT a sample of your writing and ask it to identify the key features that makes your style unique. Once you have that information, ask ChatGPT to write in that same style.

The following are the main features you want to replicate:

- paragraph length
- frequency of certain punctuation or words
- Language complexity and jargon

 - **6**: Easily readable for sixth-graders
 - 8: Aimed at the public
 - 12: Requires the reading level of a United States high school senior
 - **17+**: Graduate level
